# What are the deepest longings of your heart?

Jesus said, "I came so that they might have life, and have it in abundance."

John 10:10

Catholic writer Robert Ellsberg describes the personal quality that set apart saints from the people of their times as a "presence of life in abundance." As everyday people with real struggles, the men and women who we call "saints" were people who longed for more out of life. They were people who searched and discovered that the path to God and fulfillment in life was "at the same time the path to their own true selves." The searching heart of the saints reminds us, as Ellsberg points out, that we were created "to be fully alive," and that "it was toward this goal...that Christ pointed the way." As he reflects:

"What might it mean to be fully alive?

Obviously it is not the same as simply eating and breathing.

Nor is it expressed in a flurry of manic activity.

To be fully alive is a matter of living out of the deepest part of oneself.

Call it the heart or the soul;

These are words that describe the central and intimate core of our being,

The place where we are most truly ourselves.

Because I have seen you Lord,
And desire to see you again,
I want to believe.
I saw you, yes, when as a child
I was baptized in water.
Then, cleansed of ancient blame,
I could see you unveiled...

Now my eyes are tired
from seeing
So much light without really
seeing;
Stumbling through the darkness
of the world,
I proceed like one who's blind
yet sees.

You who gave sight to the blind And to Nicodemus as well, Infuse into my arid pupils Two drops fresh with faith.

#### For Prayer and Reflection
